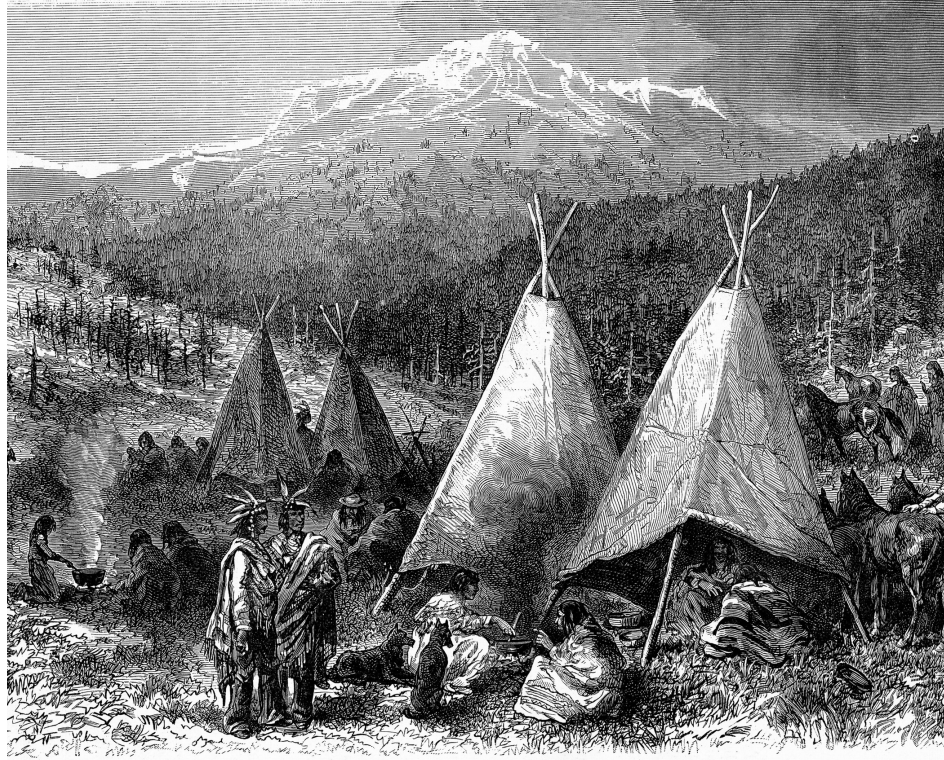


LESSON

Should Columbus Day be celebrated?

In my opinion, Christopher Columbus should not be celebrated. Columbus was a **colonizer** who tortured the indigenous people of the Caribbean islands, stole their land for European gain, and was the **catalyst** for the **TransAtlantic Slave Trade (The Maafa)**.

Columbus, an Italian **conquistador**, explored the Pacific Ocean mistakenly thinking that he could travel west and reach Asia. He was completely unaware of the continent of North America, as were most Europeans.



He was funded by Queen Isabella and King Ferdinand of Spain in 1492 to ignorantly set out on his **voyage** to seek spices and gold in Asia, thinking the world was much smaller than it was. He had not learned of the travels of Leif Eriksson, a Viking who actually landed in the Americas 500 years before Columbus, and of Asian and African sea travelers who had made settlements in a "New World" during the Ice Age. Columbus was actually the last to "discover" a land that was already **inhabited**.

LESSON Should Columbus Day be celebrated?

Columbus's voyage first landed in The Bahamas at Guanahani, which he later renamed, San Salvador on October 12, 1492. He mistakenly thought he landed in India, which is why it was referred to as West India. There, he met the **Lucayan Taino** people. They shared crops like corn, potatoes, tobacco, avocado, cacao (chocolate), and so much more. They taught the Europeans how to hunt and survive in a tropical climate. They shared their ancient healing practices and shared their communal way of life. Columbus and his crew of European colonizers shared diseases that the Taino people had never experienced like small pox, killing many of them in the coming months.



The European invaders also kidnapped many of them and killed others, claiming their land and gold. They fought back mightily, but Columbus traveled back to Spain for more **resources** like guns and more ships of European men to enslave the Taino, conquer neighboring islands like Hispaniola (DR and Haiti), and claim their land for Spain. (That is why Spanish is spoken in many Caribbean countries. They robbed them of their language.)

LESSON

Should Columbus Day be celebrated?

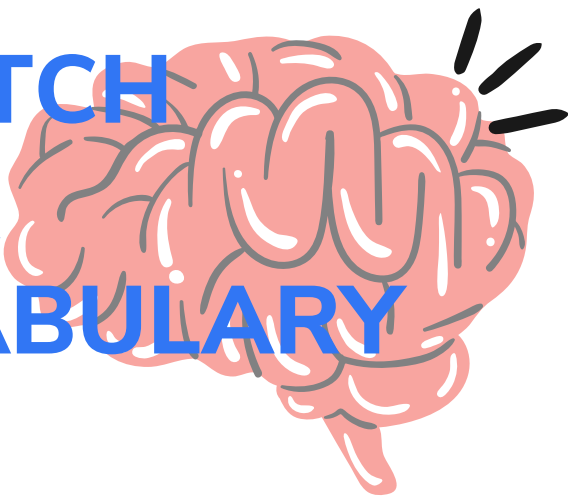
Columbus would later travel between "The New World," which was later named The Americas (that's another lesson), several times. Other European countries like Britain, France, Portugal, etc also began to colonize the land throughout The Americas (including what is now the United States.)

Once they began to see the potential for the wealth of their conquests and noticed that the Native Americans and present Africans in the New World were dying due to their bringing of diseases, they **sinisterly collaborated** to begin the TransAtlantic Slave Trade to kidnap African warriors, architects, agriculturalists, scientists, and enslave them to build European societies on Native American soil.

Columbus, an Italian conquistador who lost his way at sea and stumbled upon a thriving civilization that had been in existence for centuries, is not a hero and should not be celebrated. The Indigenous People who sacrificed their lives to defend their communities should be honored instead.
